Course Description

The course will expose the participants to the multi-dimensional world of intelligence and cyber warfare.

The participants will analyze through case studies the diverse challenges intelligence communities face in the current geopolitical world, with an emphasis on the Israeli Middle Eastern environment.

The focus will be on decision making within the intelligence world and their relationship with political leadership in democracies.



Course Goals

The participants will familiarize themselves with the challenges facing the Intelligence world;

will do a personal analysis of an intelligence event and present it in class and write a paper on the subject.



Grading

The class will meet weekly on Fridays at 0800 am.

Each participant will present (9 groups of 4 students) a case study during the semester.

Each participant will write a personal final paper case study.
