Introduction to the Program

The BA program in Government, which features world renowned faculty and combines theory and practice, prepares the next generation of leaders, scholars, and policy-makers for the many challenges of the contemporary world in the fields of public policy, diplomacy, international affairs, and strategy.

The first two years of studies at the Lauder School of Government, Diplomacy and Strategy, provide students with a comprehensive and sound knowledge-base in the field as well as state of the art analytical tools. After completing their first two years, students choose a Cluster and an area of Supplementary Studies.

The program offers five Clusters:

- Global Affairs & Conflict Resolution
- Counter-Terrorism & Homeland Security
- Middle East
- Public Diplomacy (application required)
- Business Administration (subject to certain qualifications)

Students are required to take a total of 120 credits to complete their degree.

Students will take one Cluster of 19 credits and one area of Supplementary Studies in their third year. Supplementary Studies consist of 7 credits taken from another Cluster of studies (not the one chosen as the student's main Cluster).

The breakdown of credits is as follows:

Cluster
Cluster courses - 16 credits
Cluster seminar - 3 credits
Supplementary Studies
Supplementary Studies courses – 4 credits
Supplementary Studies seminar – 3 credits
Government electives – remaining credits for the completion of 120 total credits.

Students are required to take 12 credits of Government electives, i.e. courses offered as part of the Global Affairs, Counter-Terrorism, and Middle East Clusters, as well as Additional Elective courses (see below). Academic Research and Writing and Advanced English 1 & 2 are counted as Government elective courses.

<u>Argov Fellows Program in Leadership & Diplomacy</u>

The Argov Fellows Program in Leadership and Diplomacy is part of the Lauder School of Government, Diplomacy and Strategy, but is accepting students from all IDC schools.

Building on the legacy of former Israeli Ambassador Shlomo Argov z"I, the Argov Fellows Program in Leadership and Diplomacy seeks to prepare up to 24 exceptional IDC students in their final year of undergraduate studies for future leadership positions for Israel and the Jewish people. Through a yearlong, challenging interdisciplinary curriculum, the program seeks to help the students acquire the knowledge, tools, skills and critical thinking abilities necessary for working towards meeting the many challenges that Israel faces in today's complex global environment.

The program, conducted entirely in English, combines academic training and practical skills. Its unique curriculum includes courses, seminars and "hands-on" workshops taught exclusively to Argov Fellows by leading academic and professional experts. The students participate in study tours to Europe, the United States and within Israel. Throughout the year, the students meet exceptional individuals who have obtained leadership positions in a wide range of fields and benefit from in-depth discussions with them regarding their values, career paths, and defining moments.

The program concludes with the public presentation of capstone group projects in which the fellows propose their solutions to pressing problems facing Israel and the Jewish world. Argov Alumni have carried on to eminent fellowship programs such as, Fulbright and Chevening, graduate programs at Yale, Harvard, Oxford, and Cambridge and employment positions in the public, private, and non-profit sectors around the world.
