

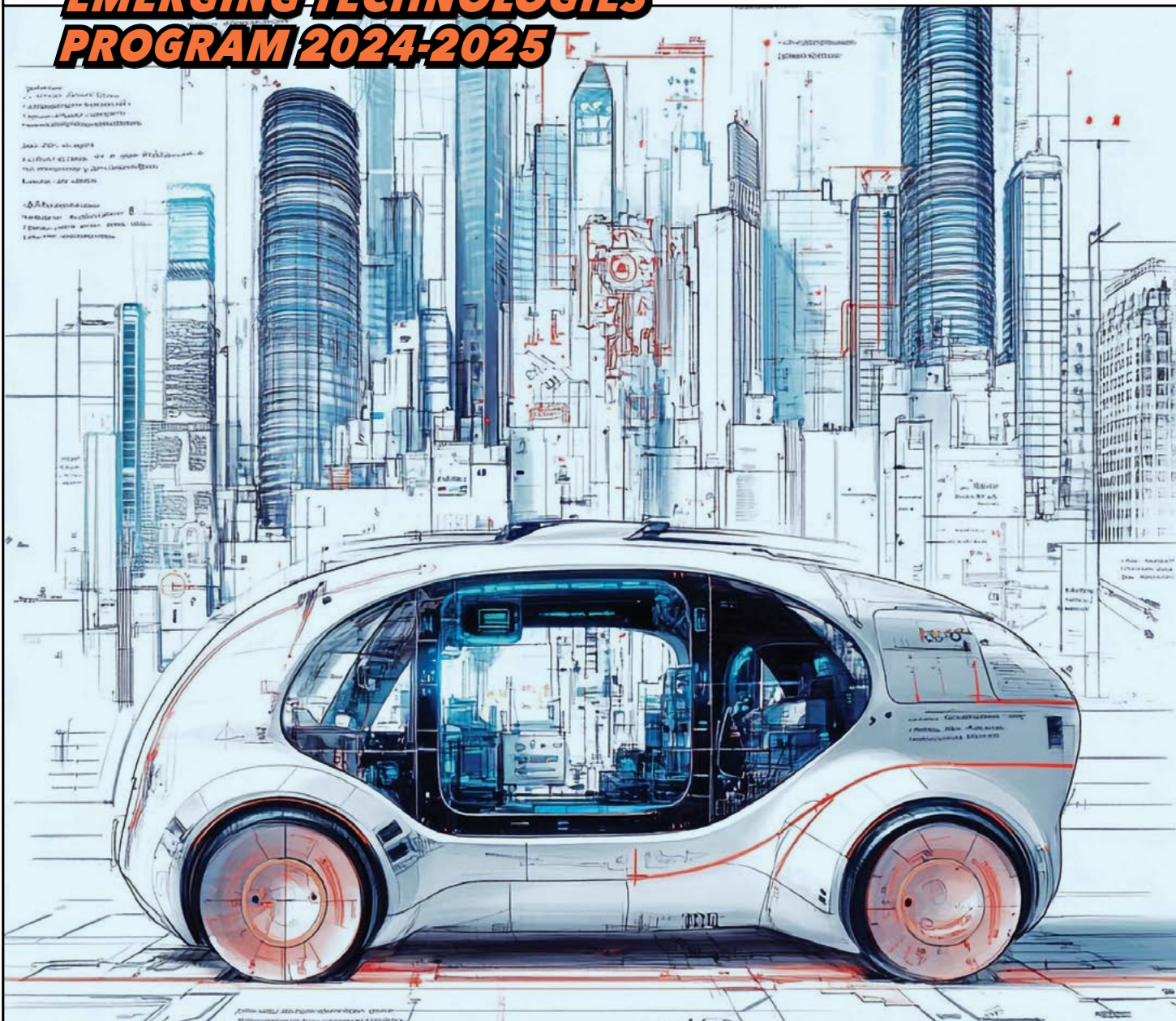

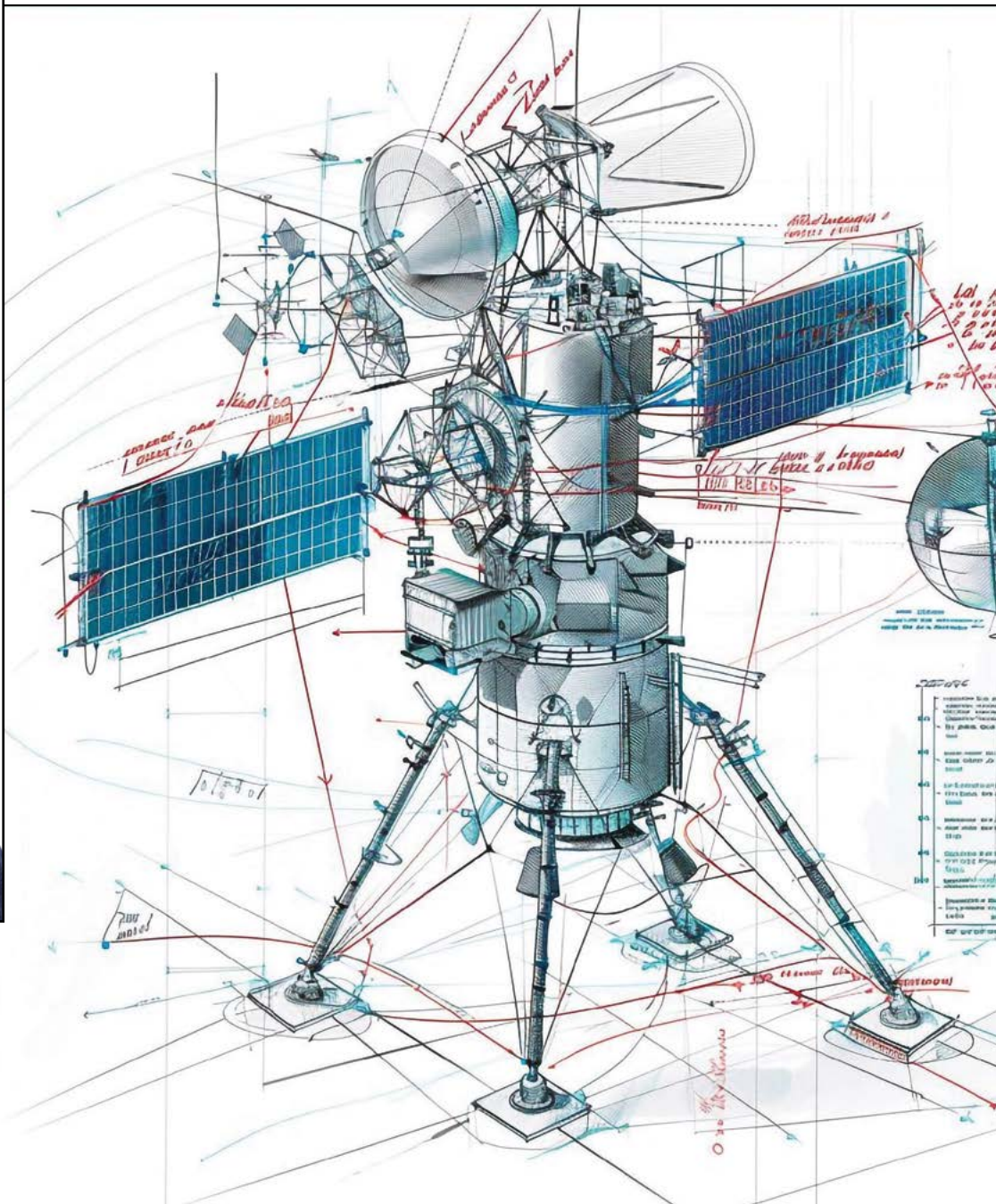

The Zvi Meitar Emerging Technologies Program, now in its 9th year, provides outstanding students a year of customized learning, practical tools and hands-on experience in order to examine legal, ethical, economic, psychological, entrepreneurial and social challenges of new and emerging technologies. The overarching goal of the program is to empower undergraduate students to actively contribute to the public discourse on these issues, with the ultimate purpose of influencing academic scholarship, shaping public policy, and even drafting laws and regulations.

This is a year-long English language program, open to exceptional students from all schools.

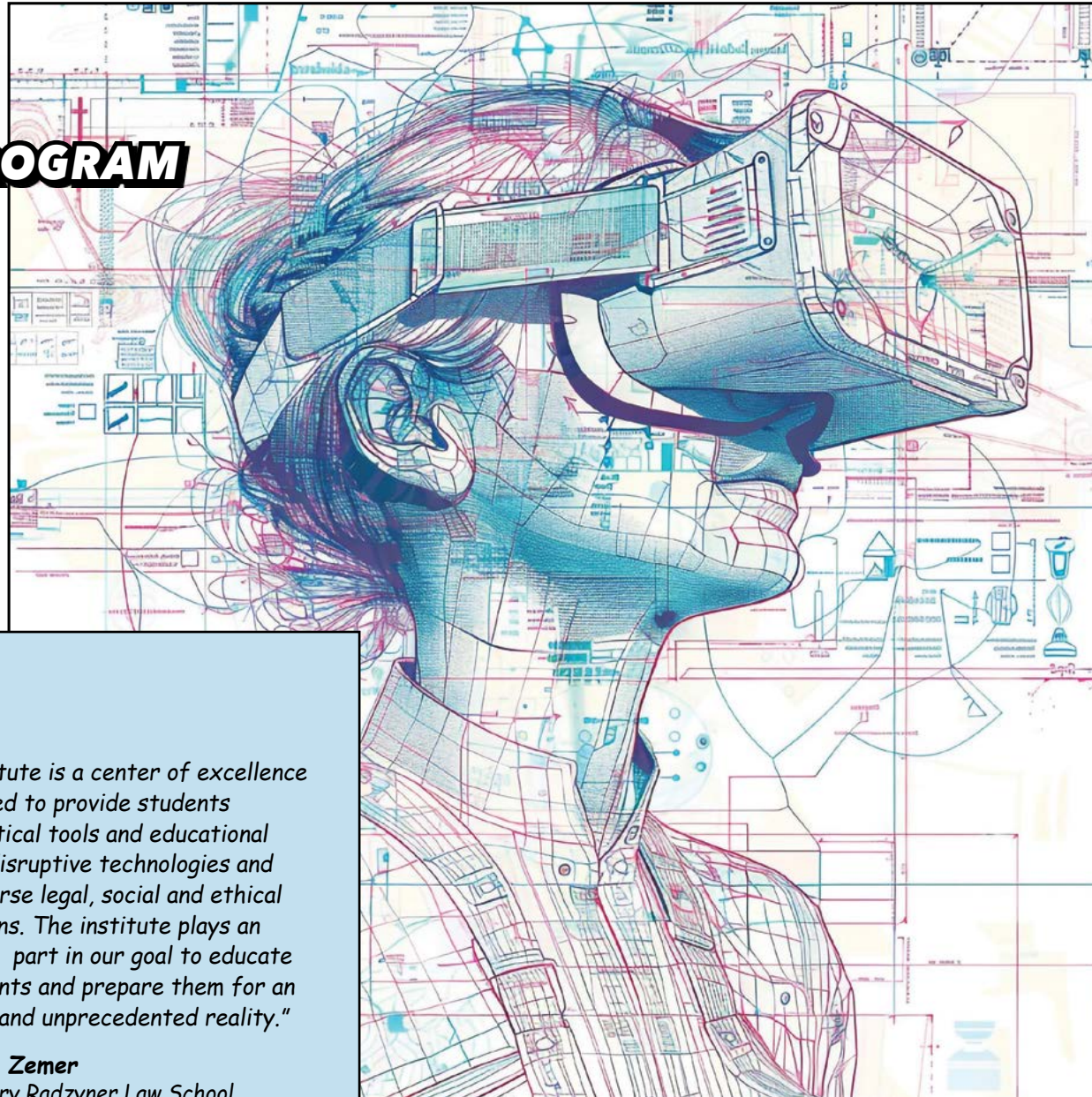
Over the course of the year, students have the opportunity to:

- Examine legal, ethical, social, economic, psychological, and entrepreneurial repercussions relating to new and disruptive technologies.
- Interact closely with industry leaders, government officials and NGOs.
- Educate and inform the public on disruptive technologies via symposiums, round table discussions, workshops and conferences.
- Publish position papers and online blogs on challenging issues in order to help law catch up with technology.

Reichman University, the first private university of higher education in Israel, opened its doors in 1994. The Fund was established by Zvi Meitar z"l in 2004 with the goal of sponsoring young outstanding people in their field and promoting selected projects.

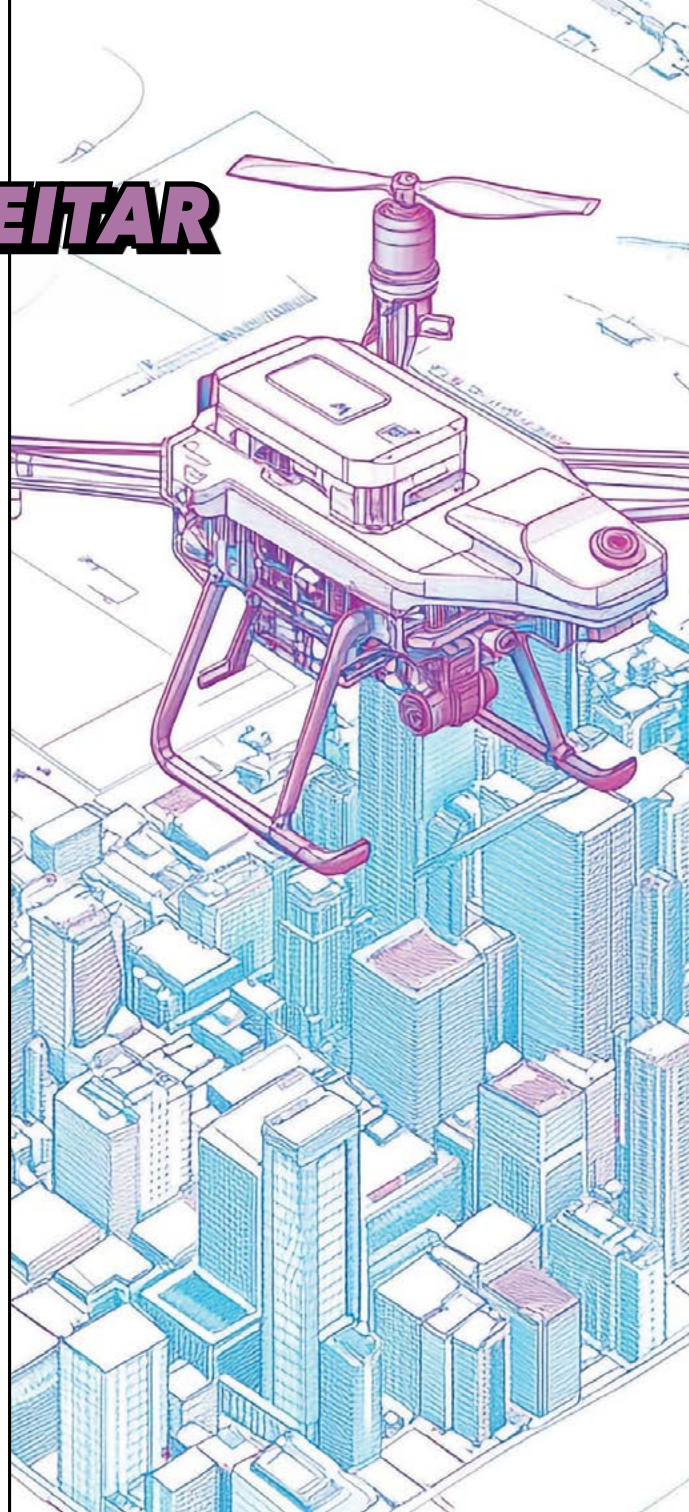
While "Education and Culture" is wide-scale, the people and projects that have been chosen create a diverse and varied mosaic.

ZVI MEITAR M. Jur. z"l

(October 12, 1933 - July 2, 2015)

Zvi Meitar z"l was born in Tel-Aviv and graduated from Hebrew University in Jerusalem in 1957 with a Master of Jurisprudence (LL.M.).

In 1962, Zvi established his law firm and became the Head and Managing Partner. To this day, Zvi's firm is the leading law firm for corporate, commercial, and international business law in Israel. The Meitar Office still operates under the Meitar name, even though Zvi moved to London in 2001 and ceased to be a partner of the firm.

During the twelve years between 1983-1995, Zvi was President of the Law Society of Tel-Aviv, the main legal association for lawyers in Israel. During this time, he was also a member of a State Committee that appoints all Judges and Justices under Israeli Constitutional Law.

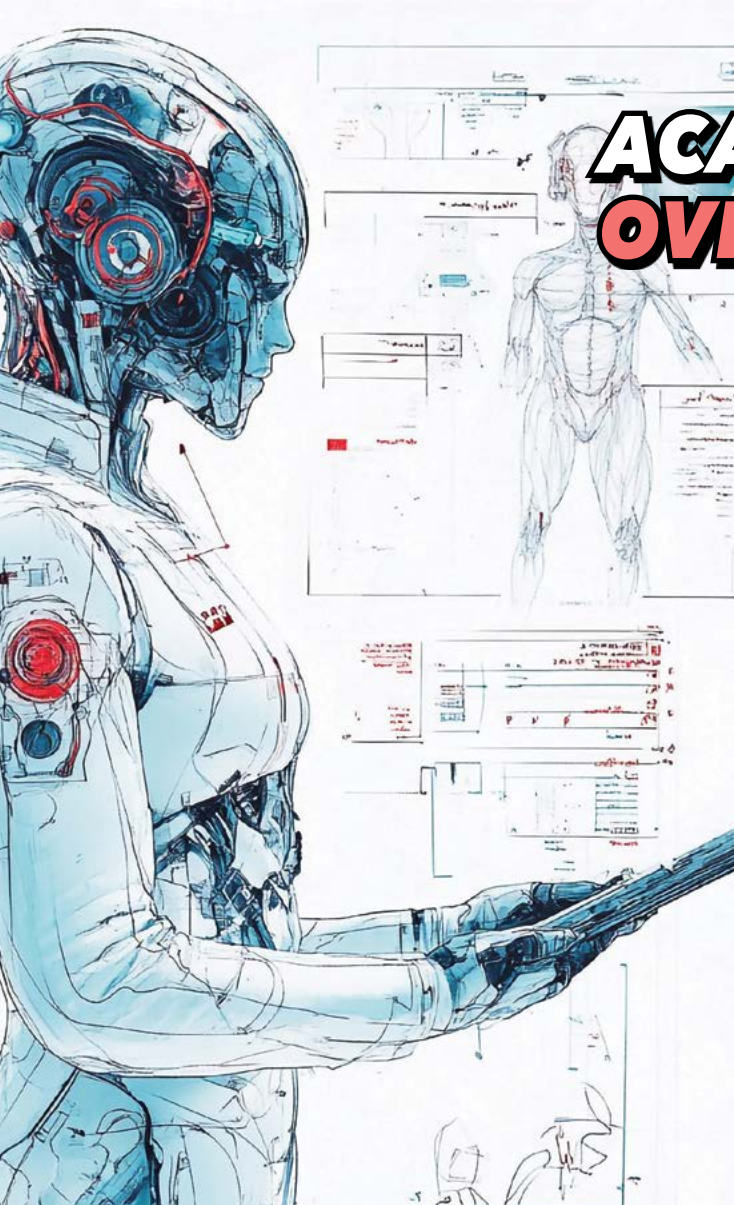
In the 1970's, Zvi became involved in international business ventures which included a partnership with one of the largest telecommunications conglomerates in Israel, with substantial international business interests, that to this day remains a world leader in Yellow Pages manufacturing and telephone billing.

Zvi established several family funds which have made substantial donations to many causes and projects in Israel and worldwide.

Zvi was very proud to establish the new & innovative Zvi Meitar Emerging Technologies Program, along with the institute that was founded in October 2014. Zvi believed in education and in granting students an opportunity to examine the challenges of new technologies, in contributing to the legal and judiciary systems in Israel and reaching out to the public on issues relating to emerging technologies, providing lay literature and newspaper opinion pages as well as regular events, featuring local and international experts on areas of Hi-Tech, Bio-Tech and Green-Tech.

Zvi was our mentor, a powerhouse attorney and a generous philanthropist, establishing one of the largest law firms in Israel and supporting numerous charitable causes. We miss Zvi very much.





ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

The Zvi Meitar Emerging Technologies is a thirteen credit program and comprises two parts:

- 4 academic credits are granted for 2 academic courses:
 - » Ethical, Legal, Social, Psychological and Entrepreneurial Implications of Science and Technology
 - » Technology, Law, and Society: Sustainable Technologies and Entrepreneurship

3 additional credits (extra credits)* for a Technology Workshop: Exploring the Dimensions of Disruptive Innovation.

The technology workshop features bi-weekly talks by local and international guest speakers who are experts in the field of technology, law, science, and ethics. These speakers will share their personal success stories in relaxed and informal sessions.

* Credit counts toward your GPA but not toward your required courses.

- 4 credits for a student research project and 2 additional credits for a white paper.

Students are divided into small groups in which they choose from real-world projects in the fields of Hi-Tech, Green-Tech and Bio-Tech. Students are guided by faculty, mentors, and industry experts, and are provided with knowledge, practical tools and hands-on experience to ensure that they are well-equipped to develop creative solutions to many complex and complicated issues associated with innovative technologies.

PART 1

Academic Courses - 7 credits

Ethical, Legal, Social, Psychological and Entrepreneurial Implications of Science and Technology

Prof. Dov Greenbaum, Academic Program Director
2 credits

This course offers an interdisciplinary exploration of the ethical, legal, social, psychological, and entrepreneurial implications (ELSI+) of science and technology. Through historical, theoretical, and practical lenses, students will gain insights into the multifaceted impact and challenges of disruptive innovation in today's rapidly evolving technology-driven economy. The course aims to foster critical thinking, ethical reasoning, and entrepreneurial perspectives in evaluating emerging technologies.

Technology, Law, and Society: Sustainable Technologies and Entrepreneurship

2 credits

This dynamic interdisciplinary course explores the intricate intersections of technology, law, society, sustainable technologies, entrepreneurship, and psychology. By delving into emerging and future technologies, students will gain a comprehensive understanding of the legal, social, ethical, and business dimensions that shape specifically sustainable technologies. The course encourages critical thinking, ethical reasoning, entrepreneurial insights, and psychological considerations to address the challenges and opportunities of sustainable technologies.

Technology Workshop: Exploring the Dimensions of Disruptive Innovation

Prof. Dov Greenbaum, Academic Program Director
3 credits (credits count toward your GPA but not toward your required courses)

This workshop aims to provide students access to C-suite executives who will provide them with a comprehensive understanding of disruptive innovation by examining its ethical, legal, social, psychological, and business aspects. Primarily via classroom discussions with expert guest speakers and site visits to innovative startups and disruptive technology companies, students will gain insights into the multifaceted impact and challenges of disruptive innovation in today's disruptive technology economy.

PART 2

Guided Student Project - 4 credits and a White Paper - 2 credits

The most striking feature of the program is a year-long research project in which students gain practical experience. Projects take a look into technologies in the field of Hi-Tech, Bio-Tech and Green-Tech and students offer solutions to complex and challenging legal, ethical and social issues.

Projects may be in the form of a white paper, drafting amicus briefs and statutes, or academic research that could be presented to the relevant institution.

Students form teams and work on their research projects throughout the academic year with the guidance of program faculty, mentors and industry experts.

PART 3

Hands-On Workshops

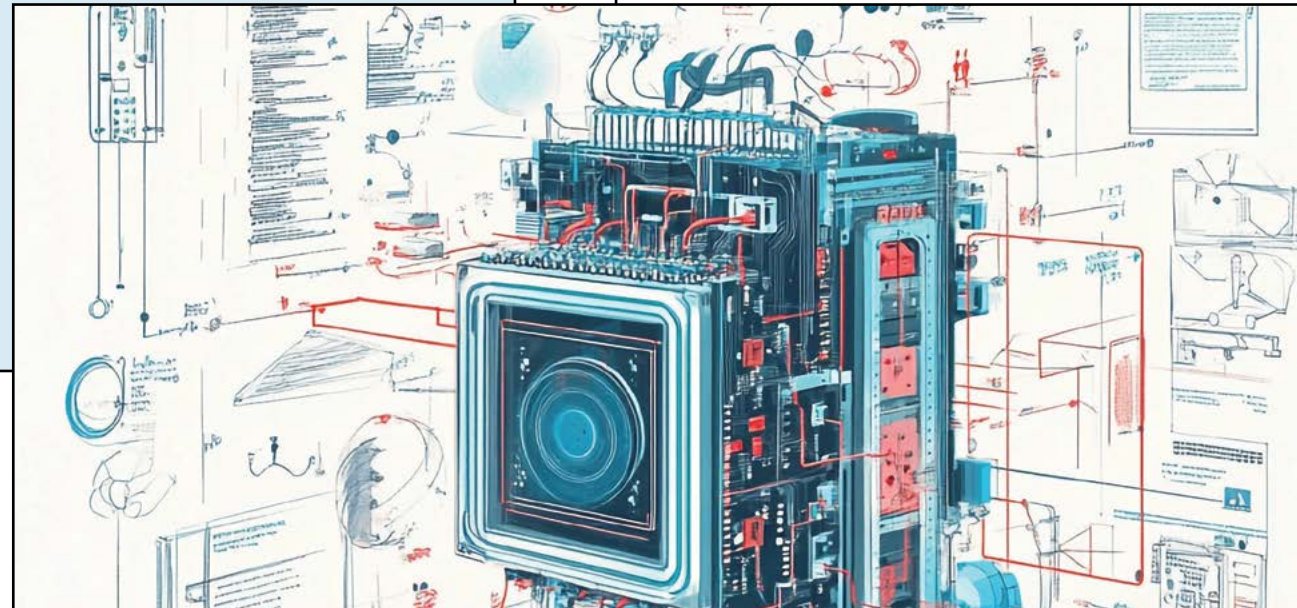
Two additional hands-on workshops providing students with powerful tools and training to support their academic studies are a Podcast Workshop and Presentation Skills Workshop.

Podcast Workshop

In this foundational workshop, students will gain practical skills and best practices for producing distinctive podcasts. Students will learn the essentials of audio storytelling from professional radio producers and podcasters as they plan, write, record and edit their own podcast.

Presentation Skills Workshop

An exhilarating part of the program is the Presentation Skills Workshop. Over the course of six weeks, Zvi Meitar students will learn the secrets of storytelling and presentation on stage. This workshop will teach students how to clearly and concisely convey complex ideas, design impactful presentations, and communicate their concepts professionally and dynamically on stage. By the end of the workshop, students will deliver an electrifying talk on their yearly research project to their mentors, family and friends at the program's Annual Closing event.

Last year, our eighth cohort of graduates collaborated with some fascinating organizations and outstanding mentors.

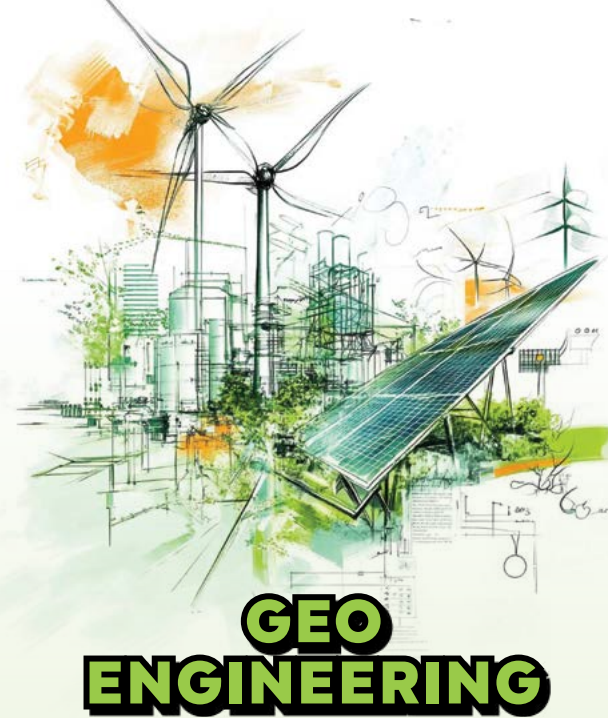
HERE'S A BRIEF LOOK AT LAST YEAR'S PROJECTS:

SAVE OUR SATELLITES: CREATING SAFE SPACE FOR ALL

Three dedicated students explored the crucial role satellites play in our daily lives, from traffic navigation to disaster prediction. They emphasized the importance of protecting satellites, especially in rural areas where they provide essential services. Their research highlighted how Anti-Satellite Activities endanger global connectivity and examined the legal, ethical, and social repercussions. They proposed proactive measures to mitigate and control private space monopolies and suggested practical solutions to safeguard space resources, including shifting the focus away from distinct technologies to create a broader and encompassing definition of anti-satellite activities.

PLAYING GOD TO FIX THE CLIMATE: THE DEVIL IS IN THE DETAILS

A group of three outstanding students delved into the emerging field of geoengineering, which offers potential solutions to the climate crisis but also presents ethical, ecological, and societal concerns. They examined two main branches: Solar Radiation Management (SRM) and Carbon Dioxide Removal (CDR). SRM aims to reflect solar radiation to cool the earth but risks disrupting weather patterns, while CDR addresses atmospheric carbon but may impact land use and biodiversity. The students discussed the ethical debates surrounding "playing God" and intergenerational justice, advocating for international collaboration and adaptive governance as part of a broader climate strategy.

PERSONALIZED MEDICINE: COLLECTING CELLS FROM CELLS

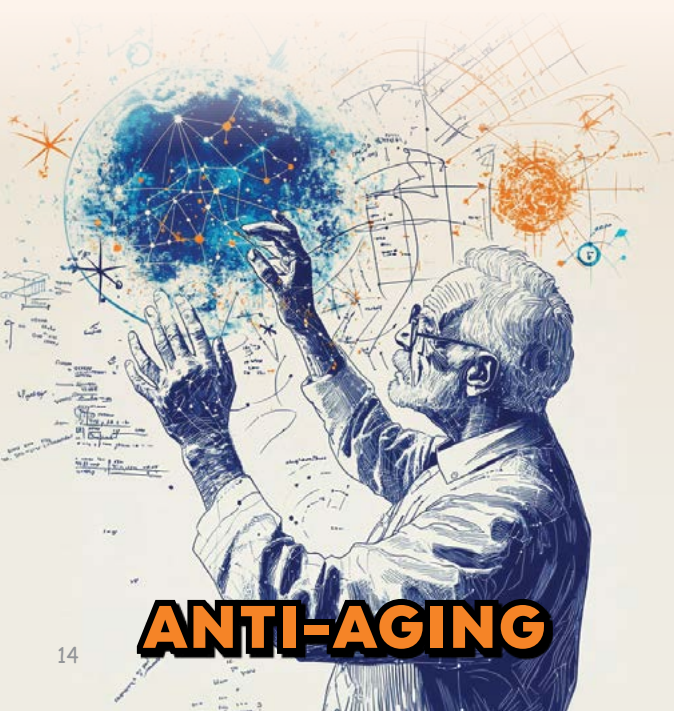
Three exemplary students explored the role of prisoners in advancing personalized medicine, which customizes treatments based on individual genetic profiles. They highlighted the necessity of collecting genetic data from prisoners, who often come from underrepresented ethnic groups, to ensure personalized medicine benefits all populations in society. Their research delved into ethical concerns such as privacy and informed consent, offering solutions to safeguard prisoners' rights while contributing to medical research.

FOREVER YOUNG: REVERSING THE PROCESS OF AGING

A team of three innovative students examined the social, ethical, and legal implications of emerging anti-aging technologies, which promise to extend human lifespans and revolutionize our understanding of aging. They investigated telomere lengthening, gerontology, and Platelet Rich Plasma (PRP), highlighting their potential to enhance health span and lifespan. The team discussed ethical issues like equitable distribution and redefining aging as a disease, as well as social impacts on workforce dynamics and age-based discrimination. They also addressed legal challenges, including constitutional rights to life extension and the effects on pension and insurance systems, proposing policies and legal frameworks to balance innovation with ethical responsibility.

OSINT

THINK BEFORE YOU POST: SOMEONE IS STOCKPILING YOUR PERSONAL DATA

Three passionate students analyzed AI's transformative impact on Open-Source Intelligence (OSINT), which enables rapid and accurate analysis of vast datasets. They explored how AI-driven OSINT extracts patterns from social media, news, and public records, enhancing decision-making but posing risks like privacy violations and data misuse. To mitigate these risks, they proposed solutions such as differential privacy and fairness-aware machine learning algorithms. They emphasized the need to prioritize user privacy and comply with evolving regulations to foster public trust and avoid legal repercussions.

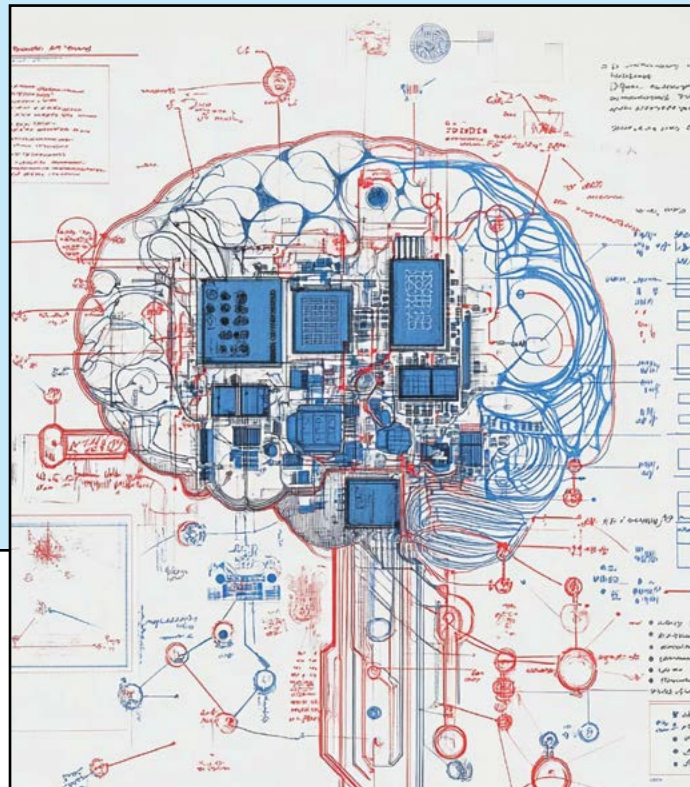
The Institute and its former fellows have had the privilege to work with various other organizations and outstanding mentors, collaborating on research projects associated with new and emerging technologies.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

Each year, students of the Zvi Meitar Emerging Technologies Program take part in organizing a variety of conferences that deal with diverse technologies and their implications. Previous symposiums included topics in the field of sustainable fashion, generative AI, NFT, blockchain and bitcoin, drones, sports technology, fintech, robotics, artificial intelligence, virtual and augmented reality, smart mobility, food technologies, space and IoT, just to name a few.



OFF-CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

The program includes supplementary tours to various organizations, start-ups, government offices and companies across Israel. These tours provide participants with first-hand exposure to cutting-edge technologies and offer valuable opportunities to connect with Israel's leading industry professionals and key figures.

Students are also empowered as they take action by presenting their yearly research projects at the Annual Closing Event and at various international conferences.

Previously, students were invited to Arizona State University as well as to Oxford University and Kings College in the United Kingdom to present their work.

Participants also have a unique opportunity to organize closed door roundtables at which experts from all fields associated with disruptive technologies debate how best to confront legal, ethical and social challenges associated with new and innovative technologies.

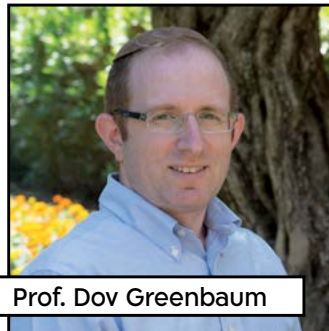

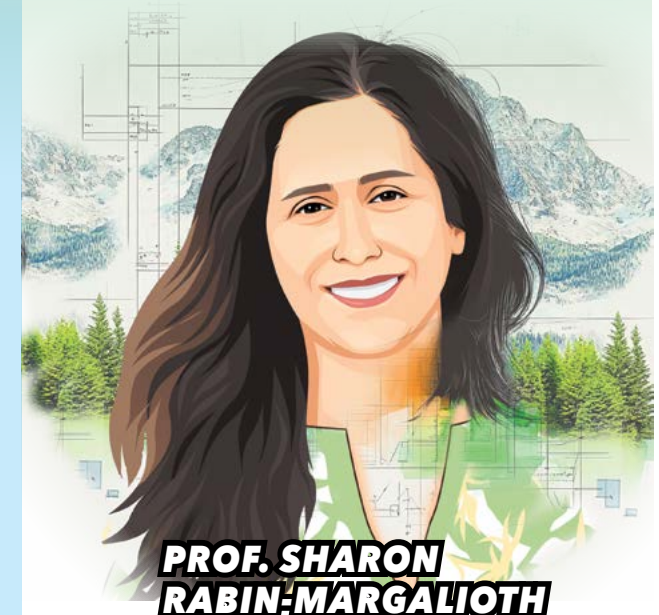

PROF. LIOR ZEMER

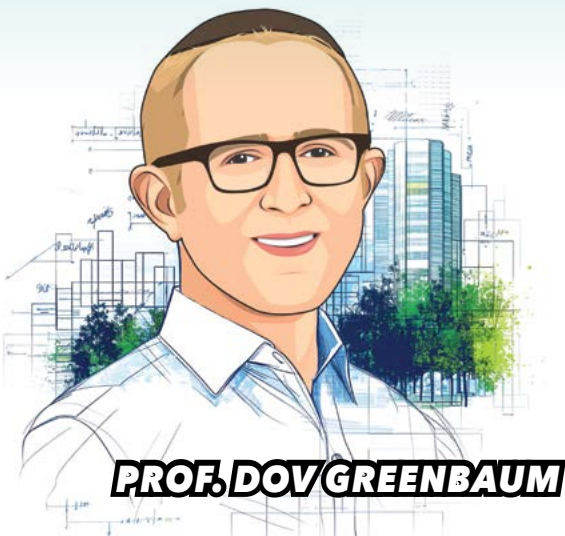
Prof. Lior Zemer serves as Dean of Harry Radzyner Law School. Concurrently, Prof. Zemer is also the Head of MA program in Law, Technology and Business Innovation at Reichman University. Formerly, he held teaching positions at the faculties of law in Leicester, Birmingham and UCL and he was a visiting professor at Boston University Law School (2003-2016) and Osgoode Hall Law School, York University, Toronto (2002-2007). Prior to joining legal academia, he served as the assistant lawyer to Judge J.D. Cooke at the European Court of First Instance and Judge S. von Bahr at the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg. Professor Zemer's research interests includes intellectual property law and policy, jurisprudence, international and European law. Prof. Zemer holds a PhD from Osgoode Hall Law School, an LL.M. (magnum cum laude) from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and an M.St (with distinction) from Oxford University.

The establishment of the Zvi Meitar Institute for Legal Implications of Emerging Technologies and the Zvi Meitar Emerging Technologies Program was largely facilitated by Prof. Sharon Rabin-Margalioth, former Dean of Harry Radzyner Law School. Prof. Rabin-Margalioth is a leading and influential scholar of labor and employment law and her articles are often cited by the Israeli Supreme Court and the National Labor court. Prof. Rabin-Margalioth is also the former co-editor of Labor, Society and Law, the leading employment law journal in Israel. Prof. Rabin-Margalioth holds a J.S.D. and an LL.M. from New York University Law School and an LL.B. from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem.

In addition to his academic affiliation and training, he is also an intellectual property attorney (California & USPTO), with experience in the fields of biopharmaceutical litigation, and Hi-Tech patent drafting and prosecution, including drafting in the fields of robotics, software, computer hardware and defense.

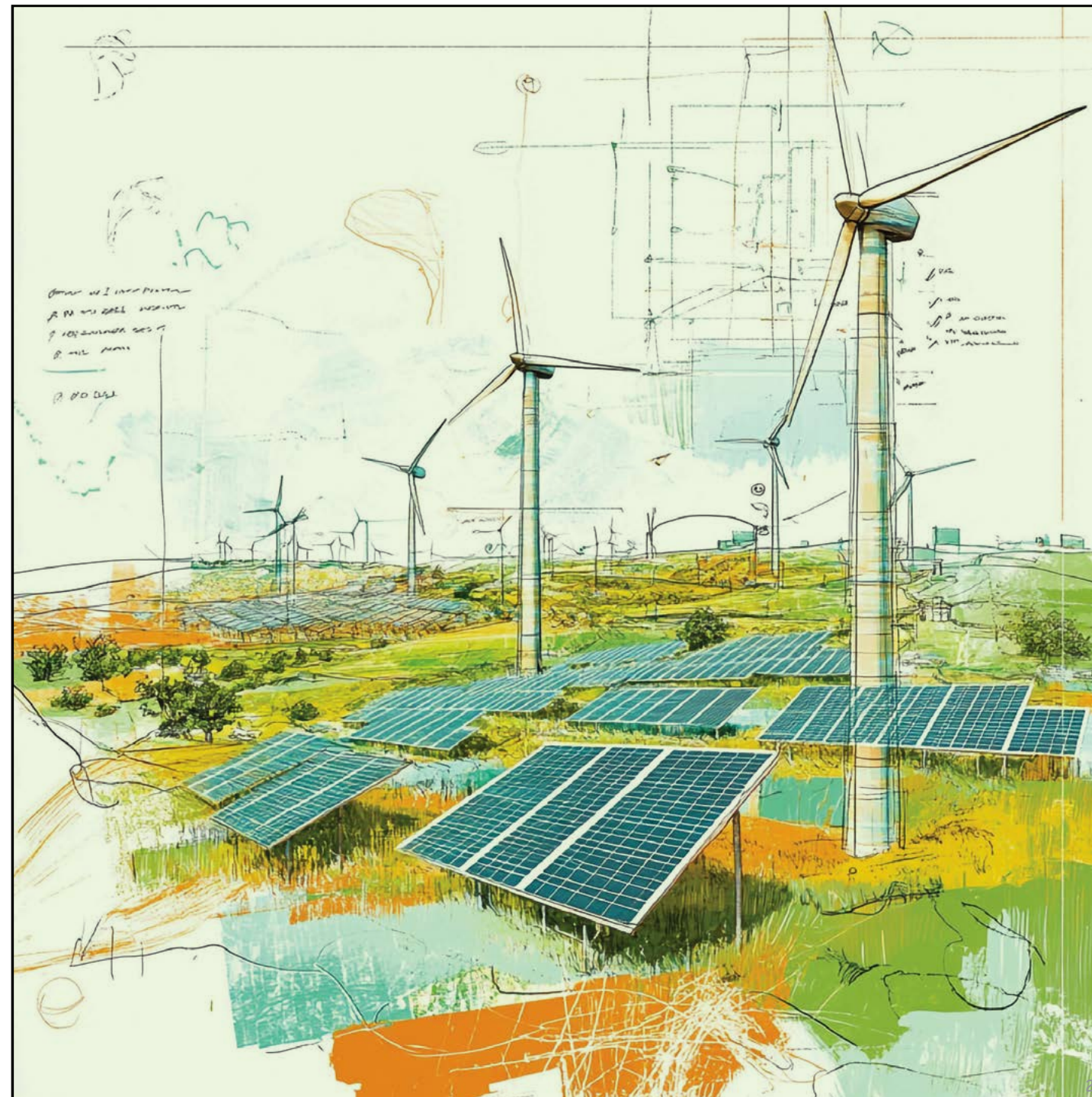


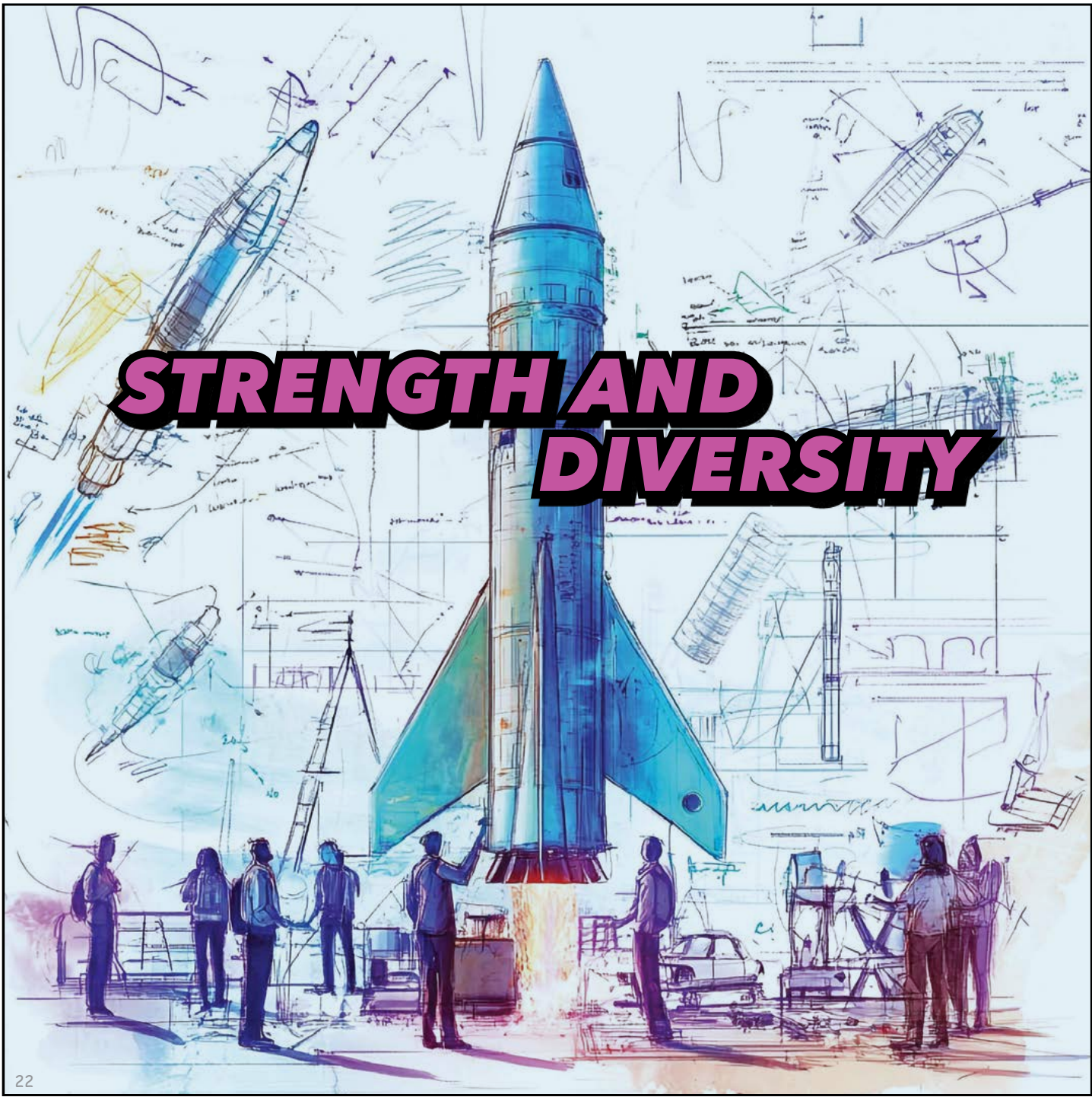

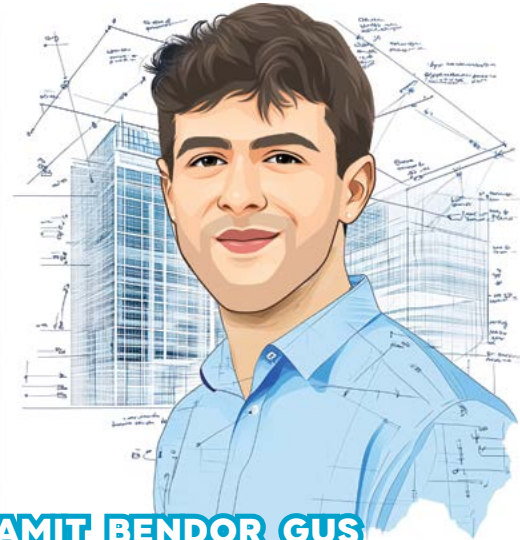

AMIT BENDOR GUS

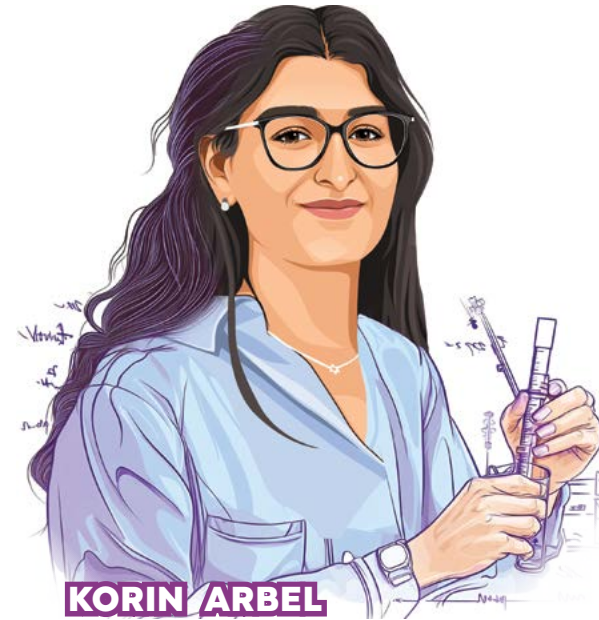
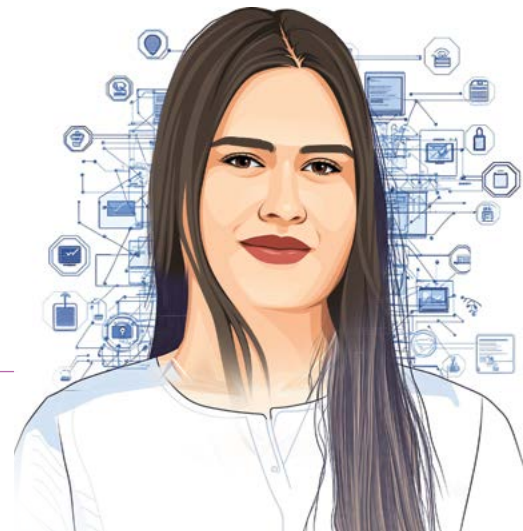

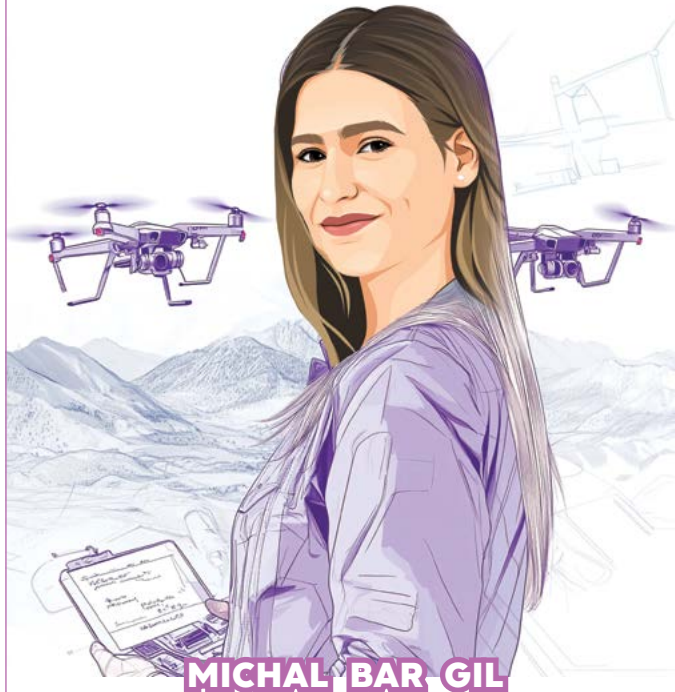
KORIN ARBEL

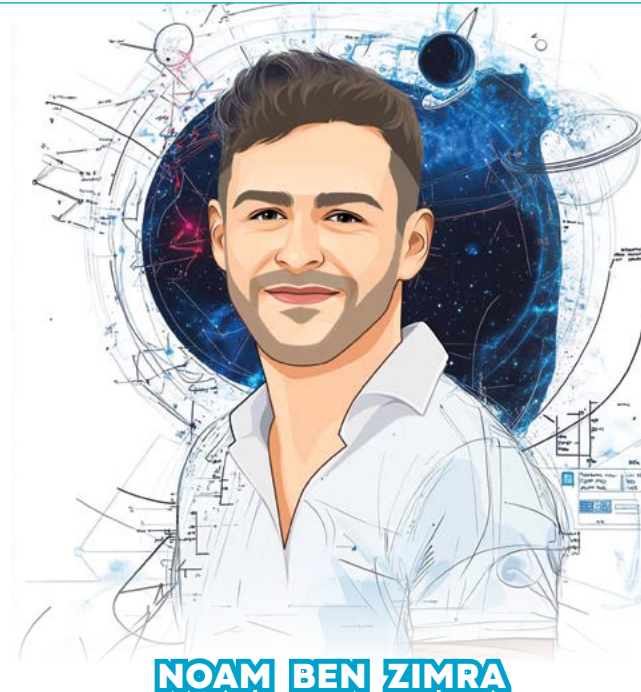


MICHAL BAR GIL

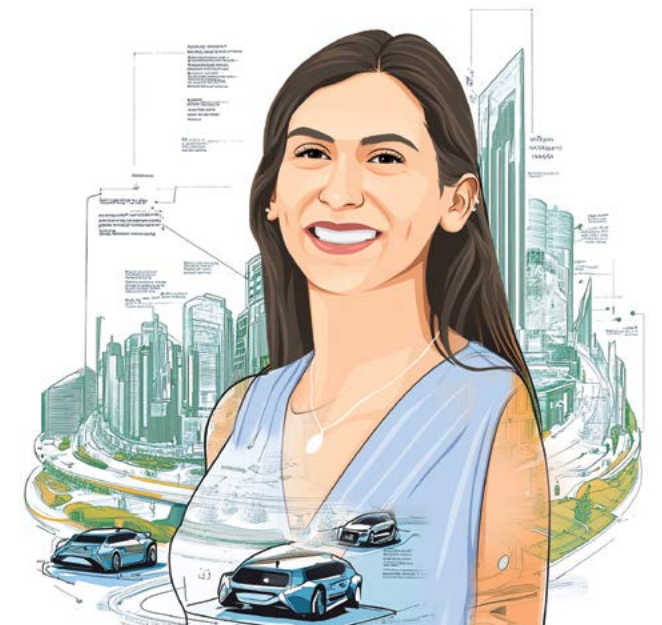


NOAM BEN ZIMRA

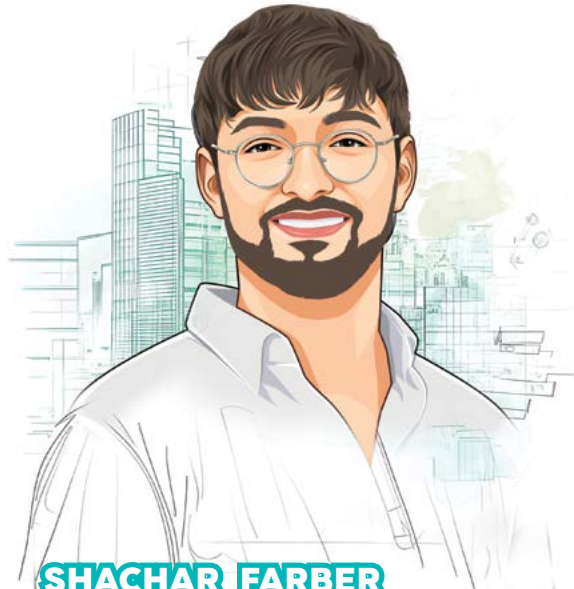
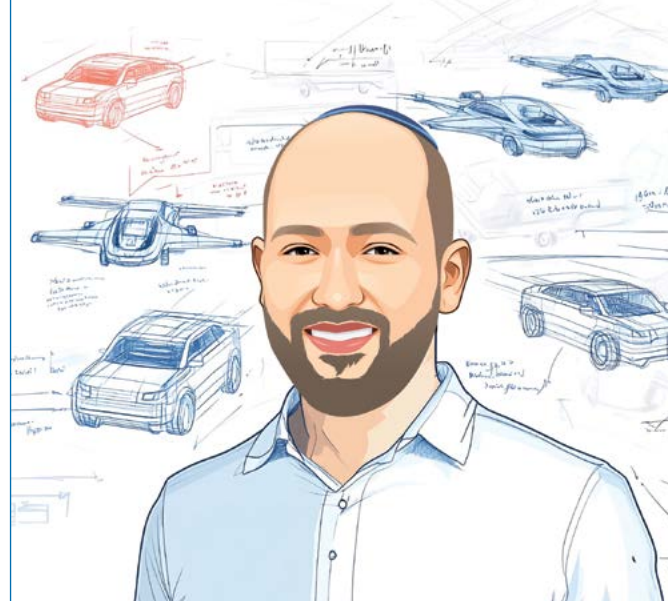
NOAM MESHULAM

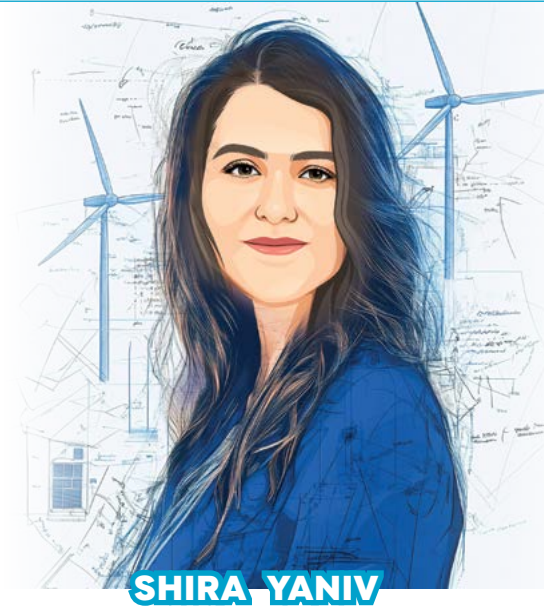
SAMUEL SNUKAL

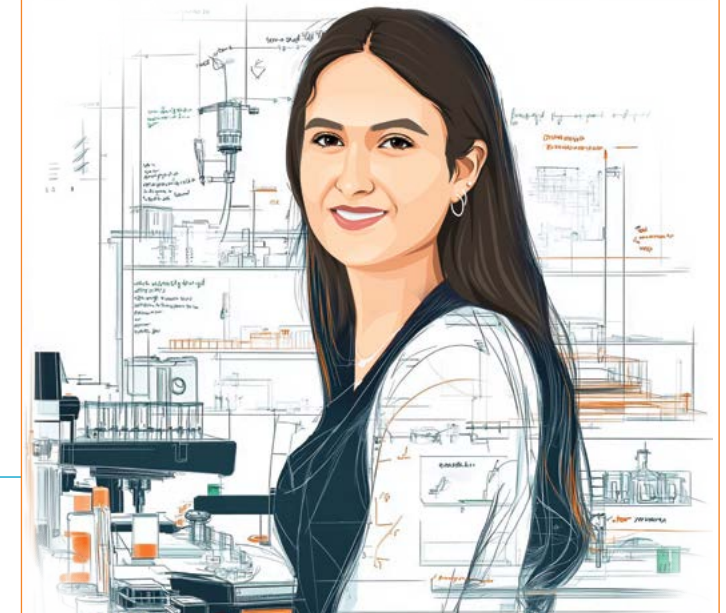


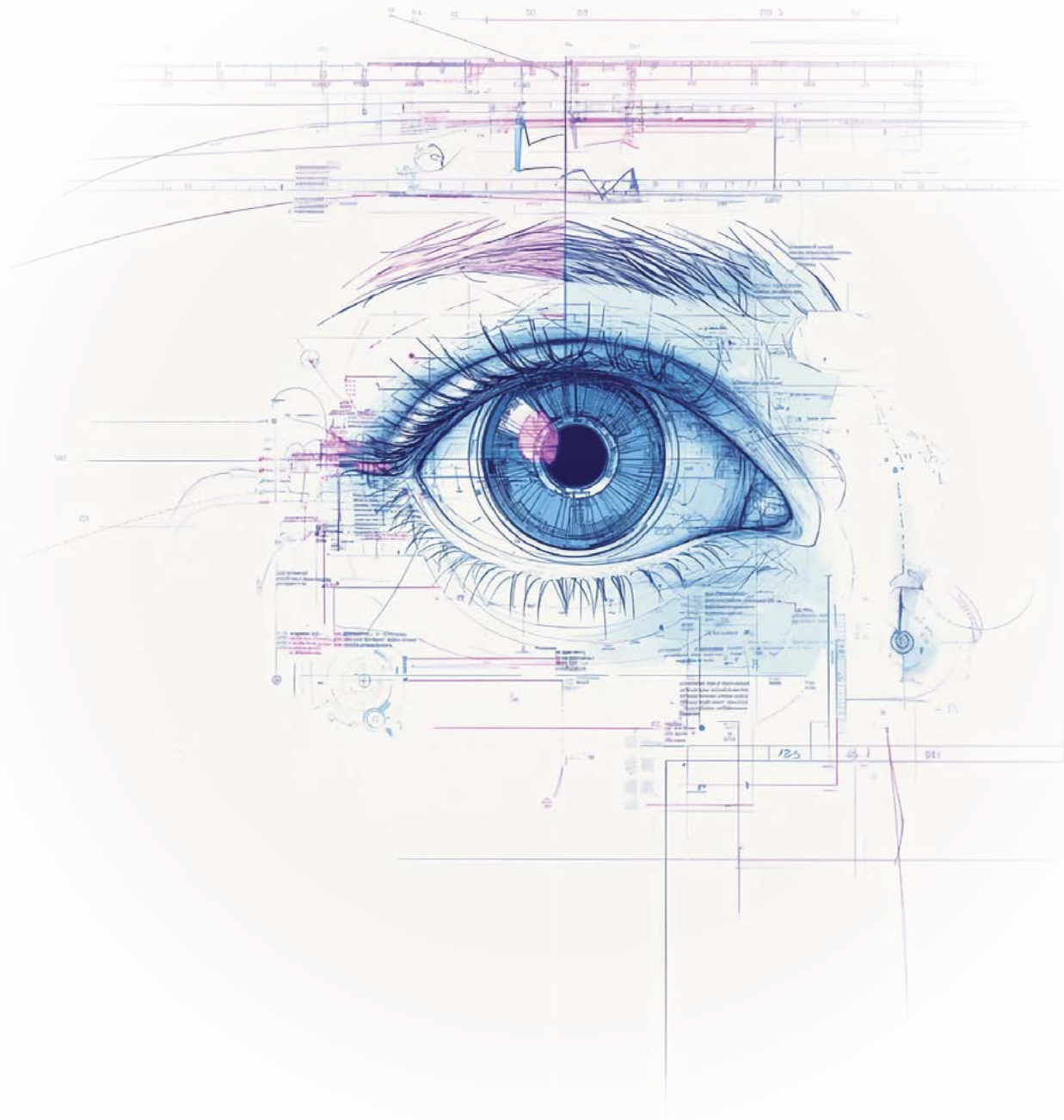
SHIRA YANIV

YAHIEL KTOOVIM

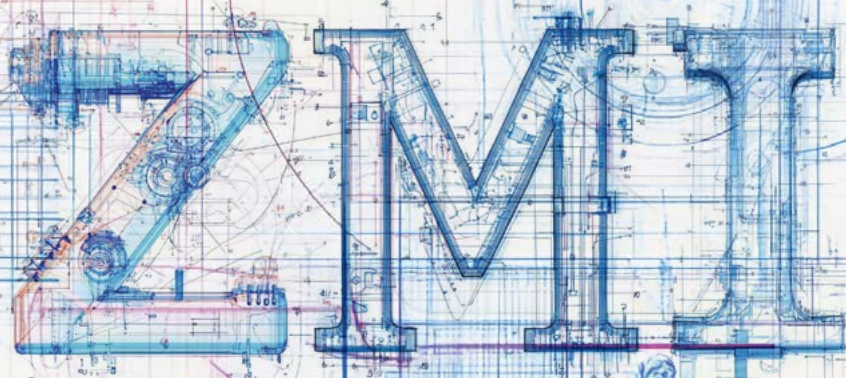
