"Risk Reduction and the Role of Passive and Active Defenses"

Overview:

The Second Lebanon War and the recent Operation Cast Lead in Gaza highlight a fundamental shift in Israel's strategic position. Israel's powerful armed forces and weapon systems were built to provide decisive superiority against the tactics used by its enemies over the past six decades. However, in recent years our enemies have begun a new arms race, aggressively stockpiling rockets and missiles, threats against which Israel has a much more limited capability. This new arms race is transforming the balance of power in the Middle East and bringing Israel's home front onto the battleground.

The evolution of this new balance – and Israel's future security – will depend on the speed with which Israel can change course and implement comprehensive new offensive and defensive strategies.

"Risk Reduction and the Role of Passive and Active Defenses", co-sponsored by the Israel Missile Defense Association, will focus on this new reality, examining the options for a comprehensive strategic doctrine to address this complex new threat that could help assure Israel's security in an era of missile war. Session speakers present unique perspectives on key elements of this new reality.
