BA in Psychology

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A great deal of effort has been expended in preparing this handbook, in order to ensure that its content is complete and accurate. However, changes and alterations to the information are possible. Reichman University authorities may cancel, alter or add courses and/or specialization programs, and generate changes in the times of lectures or in the assigned lecturer. When such changes occur, they will be published over the course of the year by various means, such as the online handbook on the Reichman University website, and will apply to all Reichman University students, including students of the Raphael Recanati International School, unless specified otherwise.

Introduction to the Program

The studies for an undergraduate degree (B. A.) at the School of Psychology, comprising 120 credits*, of which 116 as part of the psychology curriculum, and 4 as general electives, as follows:

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General Elective Courses

Psychology students are required to take 4 general studies credits, which can be courses from the General Studies Unit or from other schools at Reichman University. These courses may be taken at any time during the course of studies. With the permission of the program director, students may take extra Psychology elective courses in the 3rd year to fulfill this category.

*For students who start their studies in the 2025-2026 academic year. Changes to the curriculum may occur based on the discretion of the School of Psychology.

"Brain and Mind" Program

Program coordinator: Dr. Linoy Schwartz

This two-year program provides outstanding 2nd and 3rd year undergraduate psychology students with the opportunity to explore the relationship between mind and body, and to participate in ground-breaking neuroscience research. The "Brain and Mind" internships take place at the Reichman University laboratories and the Sagol Neuroscience Center of Sheba Medical Center at Tel Hashomer.

Admission to the program is after completion of the 1st year. Academic standing requirements are grades of 90 minimum each in: Psychology and Neuroscience: An Interdisciplinary Approach (A and B), Cognitive Processes A, and Introduction to Statistics (A and B). Acceptance to the program is dependent on an application form and a personal interview by the relevant researcher.

During the 2nd academic year of psychology studies, participants acquire methodical research skills in neuroscience. This work is conducted within the framework of a Guided Research Psychology elective course – 2 academic credits. In addition, students are required to take an Introduction to R program statistics course – 2 academic credits.

During the final academic year, students commit to 14 weekly hours of participation in a research project under the supervision of senior researchers, earning 4 academic credits in fulfillment of Psychological Skills and Field Experience, and 4 academic credits in fulfillment of a Research Seminar.

Honors Program

Program coordinator: Prof. Boaz Ben-David

This two-year program is designed for a small group of outstanding students from both the Israeli and International tracks and is conducted in English. It equips students with the skills required for a successful research career in psychology across various subfields. Admission occurs at the end of the first year (or second year for the dual degree) and is based on academic performance, a written assignment, and interviews. The program is carried out during the last two years of the bachelor's degree. In the program's first year, students attend a seminar where they engage with researchers and collaboratively analyze their work. Students learn to read and analyze academic papers, think critically, write academic papers and develop research ideas. In the second year, students lead an original, independent research project culminating in the submission of an undergraduate thesis. Students receive 2 academic credits for a required course (Course Code: 8125) and 4 credits for the research seminar (Course Code: 8144).

Second Year

Prerequisites for the second year

(Additional to the specific prerequisites required for each course)

- A grade of at least 60 in the course “Introduction to Psychology” (or an exemption from the course).
- The accumulation of 36 units of participation in experiments conducted in the psychology lab during the first year of studies.
- In order to register for methodological courses (Multivariate Statistics and Research Methods) during the second year, students are required to have achieved a grade of at least 60 in Introduction to Statistics A and B (or an exemption from the courses).

Group Guided Research

In the 2nd or 3rd years of studies, students may participate in Group Guided Research under the direction of a member of the department. 2 credits will be awarded for successful completion of a guided research project, which may be used in lieu of one psychology elective course.
