# Double Major B.A in Sustainability and Government

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A great deal of effort has been expended in preparing this handbook, in order to ensure that its content is complete and accurate. However, changes and alterations to the information are possible. The IDC Herzliya Academic Authorities may cancel, alter or add courses and/or specialization programs, and generate changes in the times of lectures or in the assigned lecturer. Such changes will be published over the course of the year by various means, such as the online handbook on the IDC Herzliya website, and will apply to all IDC Herzliya students, including students of the Raphael Recanati International School, unless specified otherwise.

#### Introduction

Sustainability is a modern concept that highlights the fundamental need of finding a balance between the natural environment, human social needs and economic development. It is an international endeavor that involves all the nations of the world, guided by the UNs program for development according to 17 SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals).

Studying sustainability-government at the RRIS offers the students a wide variety of skills and capabilities, enabling them to deal with present-day issues and challenges, from both local and global perspectives. The degree program aims to give students a broad view of the complex problems facing human society in the 21st century, and to equip them with entrepreneurial tools. Graduates will be able to fit in the public sector in government ministries, municipalities and NGOs dealing with environmental and sustainability issues; they can lead Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) reporting in the private sector, or find place in the vibrant Green-tech sector in Israel, that includes water, energy, food and transportation start-ups.

The study program has 3 components

#### Core courses

The students take compulsory courses offered in the School of Sustainability and in the School of Government in environment, society and economics. These introductory courses cover topics from earth sciences, ecology, sustainable development concepts, energy and water systems, urban sustainability and the intricate relationships between man-made and natural systems (for example: air pollution, climate change; urbanism). These courses are complemented by courses in environmental statistics, corporate social responsibility, regulation of the environment, introduction to green entrepreneurship, politics and society, international politics, and international and environmental law.

#### **Disciplinary courses**

In principle, Students may choose two specialization tracks, one in the field of sustainability and one in field of government. In the field of sustainability, students choose one of two tracks that are comprised of 2nd and 3rd year courses: (a) Urbanism and Smart Cities or (b) Water and Energy Resources. In each track, they study 3-4 specific, advanced-level courses that go deeper into these topics, with practical examples and relevant case-studies. The courses include smart cities; geopolitics of oil and gas; mobility and transportation; global urbanism; advanced water issues; consumption and sustainable life; and more. In the field of government, students choose one of three tracks (a) Global Affairs and Conflict Resolution (b) Middle East or (3) Counter-Terrorism and Homeland Security. In each track, students receive 5 specific advanced level courses that go deep into these topics. In addition, students take a seminar course in their chosen field of specialization.

#### **Practicum**

During the third year, students work in groups of 3-4 on a specific, entrepreneurial project dealing with a sustainability topic that they choose. The teams are guided by the School's faculty and aided by external mentors, and are expected to advance the project to a level of maturity and applicability. Students are required to work according to the Business Model Canvas and to present their final project in front of their peers. Students also produce a poster and show-case their idea in front of faculty members, RRIS students and family members, in a special event marking the end of their studies.
